Let's take a minute to read about some great holiday traditions!

For Hanukkah.....

Make sure to have candles available for each of the eight nights of Hanukkah. Practice the traditional Hanukkah prayers and recite them when you light the menorah.

For Christmas.....

The Advent Calendar is believed to have been created by Christians in the early 19th century to mark the days of Advent leading up to Christmas. The Advent calendar counts down the 24 days of Christmas ending on Christmas eve. It is a great way to engage the kids in the entire Christmas season by helping them channel their anticipation and excitement of Christmas Day while keeping that anticipation focused on the birth of the baby Jesus. Some Advent calendars have doors that open to reveal a symbol of Advent and Christmas, while others have symbols that are individually placed on the calendar for each day.

For Kwanzaa......

Each day of Kwanzaa represents one of the seven principles. The Kwanzaa celebrants are encouraged to discuss, meditate on and dedicate themselves to a different concept each day:

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

December 1, 1822—Dom Pedro, founder of the Brazilian Empire, was crowned as the first Emperor of Brazil. 1912 INAUGURAL MAYORAL ADDRESS BY HIGHLAND PARK MAYOR LORENZ VOLKERT —SEE HOW FAR HIGHLAND PARK HAS COME!!!



To the Honorable, the Council of the Borough of Highland Park:

Gentlemen:

As directed by the law under which our borough is governed, I desire at this time to recommend such measures as seem necessary and expedient for the welfare of the borough and in this my fifth annual message, I desire to mention some of the improvements which have been acted on during the last year, also some of which have not.

We have arranged with the Public Services Company, whereby we are given light every night in the year from sunset to sunrise.

Second Ave, on the Southerly side of Raritan Ave, have been graded and concrete walks laid. On First Ave, the work of laying concrete walks is nearly completed and will be continued as soon as the weather permits. An ordinance has been passed for the laying of concrete walks on Raritan Ave, and curbing the same, and we are promised that the Freeholders will pave this street in the Spring. We are very glad to know that the sidewalks on the Albany St. bridge are to be widened. This is a much needed improvement and the city of New Brunswick will be benefitted as well as Highland Park. This improvement is been secured by the influence and untiring efforts of our worthy representative on the Board of Freeholders.

In addition to the above named, there have been other improvements that have benefitted the entire Park and which have called for the expenditure of money, but in every case care has been taken to make the administration economical as well as thorough.

I wish to appeal to the civic pride of every citizen and urge him to co-operate with the Council in all matters pertaining to the welfare of our borough.

The Mayor and Council desire not only to do what is best for the borough, but to do it in a manner which will be most convenient and most satisfactory to the citizens and tax payers, and their friendly help, advice and cooperation would be very much appreciated.

One of the first things to which I wish to call your attention is the matter of police protection. I think that the borough has reached a stage where it should have one or two uniformed policemen, and this matter should be attended to immediately.

Then also I wish to call your attention to the matter of fire protection. I have mentioned this in every message but nothing has been done toward bettering the conditions in our inadequate fire protection. I am sure that if we had a fire which consumed a large part of the borough, the Council would immediately take action on this matter. But why wait for a great conflagration? Our citizens have the right to demand fire protection as well as police protection and it is the duty of the Council to see that they get it. -Continued on Page 7 When we have our uniformed policemen, we should have an ordinance by which he is given the authority to shoot all stray dogs which are not muzzled unless they are accompanied by the owner.

There should also be an ordinance by which chickens and other domestic animals running on large on the streets should be impounded and sold if the fees are not paid.

I think we have done very well in the matter of improving the sidewalks and we should not stop until every sidewalk in the borough is concrete or stone.

We should not slight the roads in pushing the sidewalk improvements and I believe that the time has come when stone should be used instead of cinders and the work should be done systematically one street after another and curbs would make the work of keeping the streets in good condition much easier.

It is essential that we take some steps toward establishing building rules and regulations as already we have heard complaints concerning the quality of houses erected in different parts of the borough.

Another very important matter is the numbering of the houses in all areas of the borough. This should be attended to immediately as it is very difficult for visitors to the borough to find their destination. There should be more street signs posted in different parts of the Park.

There should be ordinances passed concerning the licensing of peddlers, circuses etc., and these should be strictly enforced.

I wish to call your attention again to the matter of sewage disposal. We have kept putting this matter off for two years, but we must do something immediately or we are liable to have action brought against us by the State Board.

Now that we have a new assessor and an assessor's map, I trust that assessments of property will be equal and fair and not as in the last year few years.

I think that our borough is to be commended upon the excellent school building and teachers which it now has but I consider the grounds surrounding the school building inadequate and I hope the Board of Education will find itself able to recommend the acquiring of property adjoining the school, so that the pupils may have a play ground without trespassing upon private property.

Thanking the members of Council and our citizens generally for their good wishes and kind co-operation in the past, and requesting a continuance of the same during the year of Nineteen Hundred and Twelve, I am,
