HAPPY FOURTH OF JULY!



Do you know how fireworks became America's 4th of July pastime? According to Forrest Wickman.....
For as long as Americans can remember, the nation has celebrated the 4th of July by staging fireworks shows in public squares and lighting smaller displays at home. Why do we commemorate Independence Day this way?

It is because John Adams wanted us to. Before the Declaration of Independence was even signed, he envisioned fireworks as a part of the festivities. In a letter to Abigail Adams on July 3, 1776, he wrote that the occasion should be commemorated "with Pomp and Parade, with Shews, Games, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other from this time forward forever more". The first commemorative Independence Day, fireworks were set off on July 4, 1777. That same year fireworks also lit up the sky in Boston where they were exhibited by Col. Thomas Crafts over the common. By 1783 a large variety of fireworks that included "rockets, serpents, wheels, table rockets, cherry trees, fountains and sunflowers" were used.

While some historians have suggested that India first invented fireworks, modern fireworks seems to have come to the West by way of China. Most early fireworks were simply re-purposed military munitions, fired for entertainment rather than to frighten or kill the enemy. In the 12th century, the Chinese improved fireworks by inventing rockets, simply by stuffing a container with gunpowder and leaving a hole in one end for propulsion. During the Renaissance, fireworks became popular in Europe and were used in nationalist and imperialist celebrations by figures like Peter the Great and Louis XIV, who were especially big fans of the pyrotechnics.

Tradition alone, of course does not explain the popularity of fireworks here or abroad but one thing's for sure, there is nothing more patriotic than seeing the sky light up in red, white and blue with bursts of noise and applause!

Stay Hydrated!

It is important to stay hydrated during the hot summer months. 75% of Americans suffer from chronic dehydration. If you experience extreme thirst, lack of urination or perspiration, dizziness or confusion, headache, or fever you may be dehydrated. Follow these tips to stay hydrated.

Track & Set Reminders

Set alerts on your phone to remind you when you should be reaching for that next glass of water. Track your progress to know how much you drank.

Bring a Bottle with you

Bring a water bottle with you wherever you go. Flavor your water with fruit, mint, or cinnamon to spruce it up!

Avoid Sugary Drinks

Avoid sugary drinks and limit caffeine. Drinks such as soda and juice will actually make you more de-hydrated.

Eat Fruits & Veggies

On average, 20-30% of your daily water intake comes from food. Eating fruit and vegetables is the best way to ensure you stay hydrated.

Drink More During Activity

Drink more water when being physically active to replace the fluids you may lose through sweating.

Check Urine Color

Checking your urine is a good indicator of dehydration. If your urine is a light pale yellow or white, then you are hydrated. Darker yellow urine may mean you're in need of some water.

CHEF'S CORNER

EASY SUMMER PIE

An extra-easy, wonderfully refreshing cream cheese and mixed fruit pie.

Perfect for picnics, hot summer nights. Or even b'fast!

Ingredients:

- 1 (9" inch) frozen pie crust, thawed
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/3 cup white sugar
- 1 (11 ounce) can mandarin oranges, drained
- 1 cup fresh strawberries, halved
- 4 kiwi, peeled and sliced
- 1 cup fresh raspberries
- 1 cup fresh blueberries

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (or 200 degrees C)

Roll pastry into a 11 inch circle. Lay flat on a baking sheet or pizza pan. Prick several times with a fork. Bake in a preheated oven for 12 to 15 minutes, until light brown. Remove and allow to cool completely.

In a small mixing bowl, beat together cream cheese and sugar until creamy & smooth. Spread evenly onto cooled pastry. Arrange fruit in a decorative pattern over cream cheese layer.

Chill until ready to serve.
