#### HAPPY MEMORIAL DAY!



Yes, we all look forward to memorial Day and the unofficial start of the Summer season. But....do you know why we celebrate Memorial Day? It certainly signifies much more than just a three-day weekend!

Memorial Day is a solemn day of remembrance for everyone who has died serving in the American Armed Forces. The holiday, originally known as Decoration Day, started after the Civil War to honor the Union and Confederate dead.

It's unclear exactly where the holiday originated—Charleston, S.C., Waterloo, N.Y., Columbus, G.A. and other towns all claim to be the birthplace of the holiday. The event in Charleston that may have precipitated the holiday offers poignant evidence of a country struggling to rebuild itself after a bloody war: 257 Union soldiers died in prison in Charleston during the Civil War and were buried in unmarked graves, and the town's black residents organized a May Day ceremony in which they landscaped a burial ground to properly honor the soldiers.

In the years following the Civil War, Memorial Day celebrations were scattered and, perhaps unsurprisingly, took root differently in the North and South. It wasn't until after World War II that the holiday gained a strong following and national identity, and it wasn't officially named Memorial Day until 1967.

The final event that cemented the modern culture of Memorial Day in America was in 1968 when Congress passed the Uniform Holiday Act, designating Memorial Day as the last Monday in May rather than May 30, as it had previously been observed. This ensured a three-day weekend and gave the day it's current status as the unofficial beginning of summer, mixing serious reflection with more lighthearted fun.

May 20, 1862—President Abraham Lincoln signed the Homestead Act opening millions of acres of government owned land in the West to "homesteaders" who could acquire up to 160 acres by living on the land and cultivating it for 5 years, paying just \$1.25 per acre.

May 21, 1881—The American Red Cross was founded by Clara Barton.

May 24, 1844—Telegraph inventor Samuel Morse sent the first official telegraph message.

May 27, 1937—In San Francisco, 200,000 people celebrated the grand opening of the Golden Gate Bridge by strolling across it.

#### CHEF'S CORNER EASY TACO SKILLET

1 pound ground beef

1 onion, chopped

1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tomatoes

2 cups water

1 cup converted rice

1 (1 ounce) pkg. taco seasoning

1 cup shredded Mexican cheese blend

1 cup shredded lettuce

Heat a large skillet over medium heat; cook and stir beef and onion until beef is browned, about 5 minutes. Drain. Stir

tomatoes, water, rice and taco seasoning into beef mixture and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium low, cover and simmer until rice is tender, about 25 minutes. Top with Mexican cheese blend and lettuce before serving.

#### HEARING LOSS PREVENTION

Noise is one of the most common causes of hearing loss, and one the most common occupational illnesses in the US. A single shot from a shotgun, experienced at close range, may permanently damage your hearing in an instant.

- Ten million Americans have already suffered irreversible hearing damage from noise;
   Thirty million are exposed to hazardous noise levels each day.
- The risk and harmful effects of noise on hearing are often underestimated because the damage takes place so gradually.

#### HOW TO PREVENT HEARING LOSS

- Beware of recreational sources of hazardous noise like firearms, firecrackers, power tools, music concerts, dance clubs, NASCAR, sporting events, motorcycles, motorboats, snowmobiles, powerboats, and "boom cars".
- The risk of hearing noise due to exposure to noise is especially high among factory and heavy industry workers, transportation workers, military personnel, construction workers, miners, farmers, firefighters, police officers, musicians, and entertainment industry professionals.

#### **WARNING SIGNS**

- You hear ringing or buzzing (tinnitus) in your ears after exposure to noise.
- You notice that you can hear people talking, but you have difficulty understanding them, after exposure to noise.
- You experience "fullness" in your ears after leaving a noisy area.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO TO PROTECT YOUR HEARING

- Wear hearing protection, such as earplugs or earmuffs consistently when using loud equipment at work or at home.
- Limit exposure to noisy activities at home. Monitor your listening level and how long you are listening to MP3 players, such as IPODS, etc.
- Buy quieter products and keep an eye on your hearing. Get routine hearing tests from year -to- year.
